Summary

Greg has thirty-five years of experience researching Islam and social movements in Indonesia and Southeast Asia. He is known for his work on Indonesia, Islam, Muslim society, and politics, as well as terrorism and countering violent extremism, in Indonesia and across the Muslim world. He works extensively in Indonesian and has travelled to Indonesia on multiple trips each year since commencing his PhD fieldwork in 1988.

Since August 2015, he has been Research Professor in Global Islamic Politics at the Alfred Deakin Institute for Citizenship and Globalisation (ADI) at Deakin University. Greg is also an Adjunct Professor at Universitas Indonesia (UI), working in the School of Strategic and Global Studies (SKSG).

At Monash, Greg also led a diverse team of researchers on a large project studying based in the Global Terrorism Research Centre (GTReC), drawing on his work researching Jemaah Islamiyah and related terrorist groups in Southeast Asia.

Greg's biography of Indonesia president Abdurrahman Wahid, and his study of the terrorist group Jemaah Islamiyah have been widely influential. He has been active in inter-faith dialogue initiatives for 40 years, and has a deep commitment to building understanding of Islam and Muslim society. The central axis of his research interests is the way in which religious thought, individual believers and religious communities respond to modernity and to the modern nation state. He also has a strong general interest in international relations, security studies and comparative international politics. Beginning in 2004, he has made a comparative study of progressive Islamic thought in Turkey and Indonesia. He is a frequently interviewed by the Australian and international electronic and print media on Islam, Islamic and Islamist movements, security, and terrorism around the world, and on Southeast Asia and the politics of the Muslim world.

Greg's most recent book (co-edited and written with Matteo Vergani) is *Countering Violent and Hateful Extremism in Indonesia: Islam,*

Gender and Civil Society (Palgrave 2022). He is currently working on an ARC Linkage project on Appropriate International Development Intervention Responses to Address Violent and Hateful Extremism in Asia, researching hateful and violent extremism in Indonesia, the Philippines, Mozambique and Kenya; an ARC DP project on Religious Populism, Emotions and Political Mobilisation in Turkey, Indonesia and Pakistan; having recently concluded an ARC DP project on Religious diversity in Australia: Strategies to maintain social cohesion.

Greg is a frequent contributor to media discussion and public speaking and has been consistently engaged at a high level for the past 25 years. In the 12 months from August 2022 to August 2023, for example, he had 815 media engagements. This consisted of 364 engagements on radio, 306 on TV, 101 in online articles, 26 in print articles, 11 in podcasts, and 7 in magazine articles. These engagements have a cumulative potential audience reach of 89,782,947.

At ADI Greg leads research on social inclusion and pluralism, Islam and civil society, democratisation, and countering violent extremism. He is also a co-founder and member of the Executive Committee for the Addressing Violent Extremism and Radicalisation to Terrorism (AVERT) network (<https://www.avert.net.au>) and the Centre for Resilient and Inclusive Societies (CRIS <https://www.crisconsortium.org>). He leads research into hate and hateful extremism, and the interactions between hateful extremism and violent extremism, both in Australia and in Southeast Asia. He is a Senior Fellow with the UAE-based Hedayah Center in Abu Dhabi (since its foundation in 2013) working on P/CVE. Greg is also an Adjunct Professor at Universitas Indonesia (UI), working in the School of Strategic and Global Studies in the Postgraduate Faculty.

From 2007-2015 Greg was the Herb Feith Professor for the Study of Indonesia at Monash University where he taught politics and international relations and led research on radicalisation disengagement in the Global Terrorism Research Centre (GTReC). He was also a member of the Australia-Indonesia Centre (AIC) staff team from the time of the establishment of AIC at Monash in 2014. Whilst at Monash he also served on Academic Board.

At Monash, Greg also led a diverse team of researchers on a large project studying radicalisation based in the Global Terrorism Research Centre (GTReC), drawing on his work researching Jemaah Islamiyah and related terrorist groups in Southeast Asia.

This involved him in four major research projects:

1. In 2009-2014, Greg with Dr Peter Lentini, Dr S Moss (Monash), Dr G Gaetano J Ilardi (Victoria Police) led an ARC Linkage Grant : Radicalisation, Counter-Radicalisation, and De-Radicalisation: Developing a New Understanding of Terrorism in the Australian Context (ARC Linkage).

Greg taught at Deakin University from 1991 to 2006 (he spent 2005 on sabbatical and long service leave at the Asia Research Institute in NUS, Singapore, and in Istanbul and Boston). Whilst completing his PhD, he was approached to join the Indonesian studies program at Deakin. He chaired, taught and developed Indonesian language units, developed and taught units studying Indonesian history and society. Prior to that he had taught Indonesian at the Australian Defence Force School of Languages at Point Cook, as well as teaching Indonesian at Monash University. In 1994, he was approached to join Deakin's Religious Studies program a pioneering program established under Professor Max Charlesworth, based in the Waurin Ponds campus but with many students taught in distance studies mode. When the Religious Studies program was reduced at the end of decade Greg transferred to the Politics program. He pioneered, developed and taught innovative new units on Political Leadership in both Geelong and Melbourne campuses. He pioneered the development and teaching of units on political leadership in both Geelong and Melbourne campuses using innovative eLearning technology incorporating video and audio recordings.
